Additional Information

The Health Department reminds the public that while our county, region and state moves forward with reopening, we must continue to remain vigilant. It is important that we continue to stay home when we are sick, practice social distancing by staying more than 6 feet apart from others, wear a face covering when in public, including outdoors when social distancing cannot be maintained, wash our hands frequently and thoroughly throughout the day, disinfecting high touch surfaces and not gathering in groups of 25 or more.

We have been receiving calls and complaints regarding individuals and businesses not complying with the face covering executive orders. Listed below are the Executive Orders which are still in effect and reference the requirement of face coverings.



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New York State Executive Order 202.17 that went into effect at 8 p.m. on Friday, April 17, 2020 still is in effect. This states any individual who is over age two and able to medically tolerate a face-covering shall be required to cover their nose and mouth with a mask or cloth face-covering when in a public place and unable to maintain, or when not maintaining, social distance.

In addition, Executive Order 202.34 was put in place for business operators and building owners, and those authorized on their behalf shall have the discretion to ensure compliance with the directive in Executive Order 202.17, including the discretion to deny admittance to individuals who fail to comply with the directive in Executive Order 202.17 or to require or compel their removal if they fail to adhere to such directive, and such owner or operator shall not be subject to a claim of violation of the covenant of quiet enjoyment, or frustration of purpose, solely due to their enforcement of such directive.
